What Happens to Women Who Want an Abortion But Can't Get One?

From 2008–2010, women were recruited from 30 abortion facilities around the country.



Each site had the latest gestational limit within 150 miles-so if you were too late for this clinic, there was nobody nearby who could provide an abortion











Women were turned away from clinics who were within days of the gestational limit of each other.
